Mobile Phones

Student use of personal devices at school:

All students are required to keep their personal devices 'off and away' between the start and end of each school day and while they are attending authorised school activities off-site, such as camps and excursions.

Students may only access their personal devices during these times if they have received an approved <u>exemption</u> from their school to use the device for a specific, agreed reason.

Access refers to both physical access, including wearing any wearable technology that fits the definition of personal devices in this policy, and remote access, such as connecting other technology to the personal device's hotspot or using headphones that are paired to the personal device.

Aunty Michelle came to school on Wednesday and spent time with each class, she explained the dual naming of the places significant to the Boandik people around Berrin/Mount Gambier. Young Environmental Leasers Program Camp



Rain, hail and freezing cold winds did not stop the region's passionate Young Environmental Leaders experiencing the annual Earthkeepers Camp at Naracoorte Caves recently as part of the Young Environmental Leaders Program (YELP) held by the Limestone Coast Landscape Board, which supports students on a year-long journey.

They lead sustainability projects with their school communities with the fascinating projects being undertaken this year including Indigenous gardens, school waste audits and the construction of wildlife nest boxes.

Before leaving camp students wrote down a pledge listing the changes they will make in their own lives to have a positive impact on the environment such as reducing their energy use, recycling at home or riding to school.

They also nominate how they plan to continue connecting with nature once back at school and home.

Mid-Year Intake

A mid-year intake into preschool and school is starting in 2023. Parents can enrol children born in the middle of the year at a time appropriate to their age and their stage of development.

 $\label{eq:mid-year} \textbf{Mid-year intake} \ will start in: \ preschools in 2023 and schools in 2024.$

Term 3, 2023 – July intake (mid-year) Children who turn 4 years old from 1 May to 31 October can commence preschool at the start of term 3. All preschool children will receive 600 hours of preschool across 4 terms. Children starting preschool in the 2023 mid-year intake, will complete terms 3 and 4 plus terms 1 and 2 of the following year. They will then start school in term 3, 2024 for the 2024 mid-year intake.



School A mid-year intake will start in schools for term 3, 2024. Students who start school through a mid-year intake complete 6 terms of reception.
